## ANOTHER GOOD NEWS FROM OUR VISUALLY-IMPAIRED STUDENT

In the November issue of e-Bulletin, we made news about the academic success and tandem cycling project of a visually-impaired student: Abidin Karademir, a student of English Language Teaching in the Faculty of Education and International Relations in the Faculty of Open Education. This month we have news Kandemir's Abidin about success in tandem cycling race in the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus.

Abidin Karademir and Oğuzhan Can ranked first in the tandem cycling race run with a total of 16 cyclists in eight tandem teams from Turkey, i.e. three from Eskişehir, two from Ankara and three from Izmir. A lot of effort has gone into the organization of flight, packaging and shipping of bicycles, and getting required permissions; however, "success and experience has been worth all the effort," he added.

The teams competed on a medium-length track of 57 km, which mostly consisted of slopes. The cyclists competed under difficult conditions. However, "we ranked first in the race and cycled 33 kilometers further to complete the longer track, namely 90 km," Karademir said.

Karademir highlighted that the organization crated a warm environment where sighted and non-sighted people came together. "In such events, the main goal is not to get a top rank in the race, but to bring together sighted and non-sighted people. Greater support to the organization of such events will allow visuallyimpaired people to get more integrated with the society," he continued.

Abidin Karademir, lastly, thanked to Eskişehir Directorate of Youth and Sports, Vel-Esbid (Eskişehir Cycling Association), and Eskişehir Sports Club for the Visually Impaired.
